

When keeping livestock, animals should be treated fairly, and their welfare and needs looked after so that we can consume their meat, milk and eggs with a clear conscience. There has been a great deal of investment in humane animal husbandry over the past 30 years – animal welfare legislation has been tightened, stalls have been converted, new labels have been established and the topic has been widely debated. But what about the slaughter of these animals?


We seem to be more afraid of tackling this taboo topic. At this year's SAP livestock conference, we will therefore focus on this last stage in animals' lives. Everyone must decide for themself whether there is such a thing as humane slaughter, but it is a fact that some slaughter methods are more humane than others, e.g. when livestock trails are designed to minimise animal stress as they enter stunning facilities, anaesthetic methods are effective and successful stunning is guaranteed. One thing we can all agree on, however, is that this is a highly emotive topic and that every animal facing slaughter deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. A great deal of work is currently under way – both in Switzerland and internationally – to minimise the amount of stress and suffering that animals are exposed to in the last minutes of their lives.

At this year's livestock conference, speakers from the world of science and research, from inspection bodies and from animal welfare organisations including STS will provide an update on the practical steps being taken to enhance animal welfare in abattoirs in Switzerland and abroad. We are honoured to welcome back renowned expert in the humane treatment of livestock for slaughter, **Professor Temple Grandin** from Colorado State University, following her last appearance at our conference five years ago. She has written many books on the topic and is known throughout the world. Professor Grandin has been applying her extensive knowledge of animal behaviour for decades, particularly in North and South America, to improve conditions for livestock during transportation and in abattoirs.
